The Ellison Onizuka Award is a living memorial to Hawaii's first Astronaut, Eagle Scout Ellison S. Onizuka. This award can be earned by individual Scouts BSA Scouts, Venturers, and Sea Scouts. The purpose of this award is to continually challenge all Scouts to be their best in the tradition of Astronaut Ellison Onizuka.


This award is a three-inch (3") pocket patch for each individual Scout/Venturer/Sea Scout.

The requirements were developed keeping with Challenger's statement, "**The lessons derived from Scouting experiences is good citizenship, and self-discipline to the preparations for adult responsibilities.**" As each Scout earns the Ellison Onizuka Award, they will find themselves further along the Eagle Scout trail.

Each individual Scout must complete the requirements outlined in Good Citizenship, Effective Leadership, Self-Discipline, Adult Responsibilities, and High Adventure.
